MA American Studies

(One Year Full Time)

This is the first graduate programme in American Studies in Ireland. Because of the United States' unrivalled status in the world today, the debates on American values and the mission of American democracy have become a matter of global concern. This programme introduces students to advanced study of American culture and politics, in both domestic and international contexts. It is a multidisciplinary programme that promotes study of the interactions of cultural, social and political factors. It aims to deepen and widen

students' knowledge of major topics and issues as well as to enable them to develop a significant measure of expertise in their chosen thesis subject. The programme affords opportunities to study the US across a range of disciplines – including history, literature, media and visual studies, politics and international relations – and to develop skills in analysis, critical thinking and primary research techniques.
