Introduction

The MSc and Graduate Diploma in Hunter-Gatherer Archaeology is for students interested in the fascinating and remarkable world of hunter-gatherers. It is often claimed that humans have spent 90-99% of their existence as hunter-gatherers. Understanding these ways of life provides vital perspectives on human identity and the challenges and opportunities societies face today. Archaeology is the only discipline that can provide this information.

Our programme will introduce students to key themes in the archaeology of past hunter gatherers, the relationship between past and present hunting and gathering communities, and the contemporary context of knowledge production about hunter-gatherers. Our primary focus is the archaeology of *Homo sapiens* huntergatherers: we will include some discussion of non-*Homo sapiens*, but this is not a course on human evolution.

You will develop skills in project design and independent research, data analysis and interpretation, communicating the past to different stakeholders, as well as how to different perspectives on the past. You will be part of a dynamic, friendly and international postgraduate community in a School with a 160-year history of exceptional archaeological research and you will form part of the UCD Hunter Gatherer Research Group.

Course Content and Structure

Fieldwork and Research Opportunities

The MSc Hunter-Gatherer Archaeology programme feeds into active field-work, lab and practical research projects carried out by members of the UCD Hunter-Gatherer Research Group. This will include excavations of Mesolithic site(s) in the Cairngorm Mountains of Scotland as well as Mesolithic sites in Ireland. Students will have the opportunity to join these projects in the field or in post-excavation and to work on related materials for their dissertation.

Applicant Profile

- The MSc and GradDip programmes are intended for applicants with a degree in archaeology, anthropology, or cognate disciplines such as geography, history, environmental studies, or professionals working in museums, heritage management or related areas. - An upper second class honours degree, or international equivalent is required for entry to the MSc.
- Candidates who possess a lower second class honours degree are encouraged to consider the Graduate Diploma programme. Subject to performance in the first trimester, students may transfer to the full MSc programme.
- Applicants whose first language is not English are also required to submit evidence of their English Language proficiency. It is expected that applicants will normally have reached on overall 7.0 in IELTS or equivalent.
