<h2>Academic Year 2019/2020</h2>

The eurozone crisis, the migration crisis, and Brexit have called into question the politics of European integration. It has exposed the fragiltiy of joining diverse political economies into the EU, whilst exacerbating the conflict between democratic states and global financial markets. The purpose of this course is to analyse the political and policy consequences of European integration, paying particular attention to countries in the single currency.

The course is taught in three parts. The first part examines the political and economic history of the EU, and the co-evolution of national varieties of capitalism within Europe post-WW2. it will be suggested that the EU is a regional response by nation-states to the international processes of globalisation. The second part examines the political and economic rationale for the establishment of the single market and the EMU, and the fallout from the eurozone crisis. The final part of the course examines the politics of Brexit, and the rise of populist far-right parties.

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What will I learn?

Learning Outcomes:

This is a course in comparative political economy using the European Union (EU) as an international case study. It is both theoretical and empirical. Each seminar is constructed around a set of core readings. You must read these before class and prepare a critical response.
