This course involves a critical reading of selected key texts in twentieth-century phenomenology and existentialism. This module will trace the major themes and movements in classical and contemporary phenomenology and existentialism through several key thinkers, including Franz Brentano, Edmund Husserl, Edith Stein Martin Heidegger , Jean-Paul Sartre, Simone de Beauvoir, Maurice Merleau-Ponty, and Irish Marion Young. Themes that will be critically considered include: intentionality, consciousness, self-consciousness, embodiment, perception, emotion, empathy, intersubjectivity, and the constitution of the life-world.
